COURIER FRAUD

In recent months, fraudsters in the South East have been using the railway network and unsuspecting taxi drivers to defraud thousands of pounds from elderly or vulnerable members of the public.

We need your help to prevent further crimes and to catch those responsible.



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WHAT IS THE SCAM?



A fraudster phones their victim and claims to be from their bank or the police. They then tell the victim their bank card has been cloned or there has been suspicious activity on their bank account.



The victim is asked to withdraw a large amount of cash to assist with the investigation and to return home, where it will be collected by a courier for examination.



The fraudster uses a local taxi to attend the victim's address and collect the cash.





HOW ARE TAXI DRIVERS INVOLVED?

- A number of these couriers travel to the South East by trains from London.
- At the local railway station, they hire the first available taxi in the rank.
- The courier directs the taxi to the victim's address and instructs the driver to wait.
- The courier returns to the taxi after only a few minutes (usually carrying a package) and goes back to the railway station, where they board the next London-bound train.

HELP TO PROTECT AGAINST COURIER FRAUD



Be vigilant if you are asked to carry a potential courier from a local railway station to an address and back again.



If you suspect a passenger is a courier, call the police when it is safe to do so on 999 and quote Operation Recover. Give your taxi's registration (number plate), location and destination. The police will immediately recognise this as a courier fraud.



Raise awareness among your regular elderly passengers.



If you carry unusual repeat fares to local banks, **contact** the police.
